Approach

"X-ray", "Universe Inside" series

Yves JUMEAU, alias ROBOAM, has always had an attraction for the medical field, with a fragile childhood health and a very significant scoliosis.

Yves Jumeau's work has always been marked by his questions about the human condition and, in particular, about man's ability to be free, responsible for his choices and actions, but also to be perfectible. He explored these philosophical themes through sculptures, uncompromising and even provocative installations, ready-mades, performances and interventions. Fascinated by the body as the object of this questioning, he had the privilege of accompanying an obstetrician in a surgical block during a day of surgery. This experience opened a new field of exploration for him.

X-rays, carried out in the company of a manipulator in radiology, are the basis of this work, a true celebration of the complexity of life.

Roboam engages this material, which he used earlier in some sculptures, in an abstraction that plunges us into questioning our certainties and uncertainties. Moreover, Roboam questions our relationship to pictorial expression, which is no longer linked solely to painting.

<u>LensCulture</u>

Hello Yves. It is a pleasure to review "X-Ray." This is a very strong body of work. Each image is evidence of your understanding of photographic techniques alongside a wonderful understanding of painting and composition. Your manipulation of the X-Rays are beautiful.

I like all of your images and would not edit any of them out. In fact, I only want to see more.

I would suggest telling us a little bit more about your process in your artist statement. Why are you using X-Rays as your subject matter? Are you a radiologist? Did you have an accident? Letting your audience into the motivations for your process will help deepen their experience of your images. Your images remind me of constellations and galaxies: which is wonderful because so many consider the body to be a universe unto itself. Your images remind me of the elements of the earth (the rust/iron like colors). Your images have so much movement and sensuality. This is a lovely body of work.

I highly recommend attending portfolio reviews and submitting your work to galleries and museums. I believe there would be a lot of interest in your work in the fine art world. You might consider attending portfolio reviews as this is a wonderful way to gain wide exposure in a short time. It was a pleasure to view your images. Congratulations and best of luck!

Your series is original and thought-provoking. It also has a visual impact by being abstract in color, the viewer can imagine cells, insides of a human body. We no longer are viewing x-rays as we are used to.

You've chosen well your first image, it's the most like a normal x-ray providing a visual introduction for the viewer. One gets a hint of what they are seeing, without the need for caption or submission statement. Your submission statement adds greater meaning to the images.

I encourage you to develop and add images to your series that are similar to your first image with a bit more of the recognizable skeleton. This will create a greater visual balance to your series. There is a switch of color in final image (vibrant purple) that varies from the earth tones, you could consider including or developing more images like this one.

Your series is interesting, one can see cosmos, cells, the imagination is provoked. The bridge between medical imagery and digital revolution is explored through your work. You may enjoy looking at some of the Masters including Wynn Bullock's - 'Color Light Abstractions' and Minor White work that deals with texture and form 'Sequence'.
